


AIPA APPROACH

AIPA's approach is powered by the belief that a better world is possible. In vulnerability, in hardship, in more than 700 women groups in country, we partner to put bold solutions into action — helping women triumph over adversity and build stronger communities from within. Now, and for the future.

The rural resilience livelihood activity will enable individuals and communities to engage in strong and sustainable market systems rather than continuing to rely on humanitarian assistance, and faltering with each new shock. To achieve this purpose, the Activity will have four components and four cross cutting elements:

- **Component 1:** Provide up-to-date evidence for selection of market systems, livelihoods and employment opportunities that contribute to inclusive and resilient economic growth, sustainable livelihood and improved nutrition.
- **Component 2:** Stimulate market systems growth and diverse economic opportunities
- **Component 3:** Build capacity to take advantage of market systems opportunities.
- **Component 4:** Sequencing, layering, integrating (SLI), collaborative and adaptive learning to improve activity effectiveness, sustainability, and scale.

Fights poverty, hunger and ploughing prosperity

Why does restoring dignity matter in fighting on behalf of the poor? Dignity sustains the poor while defeating the circumstances of poverty. Sustainable livelihood for all especially for extreme poor women and men is the solution.



WOMEN AND GIRLS DRIVE CHANGE

The team of AIPA believe women and girls are the agents of change for our country.

AIPA looks for opportunities to bring about the deepest, most effective impact. In rural areas of West Bengal especially districts of Purulia, Birbhum, Sundargarh district of Odisha, and Golaghat district of Assam that start with women and girls who carry the greatest burdens of poverty. When we saw girls dropping out at the start of high school, we piloted girls' groups to overcome challenges. We've learned that mothers determine the outcomes for their children. Supporting women with stable income opportunities puts food on the table, safe drinking water and health care for every stage of motherhood results in thriving families.

Shanti's Struggle

Shanti has lived in Bamun Gaon village in rural Assam for her entire life. Because of where she lives, she shared the burden of millions of girls and women across rural India – spending hours each day collecting unsafe drinking water, instead of going to school or earning an income. Three times a day, Shanti collected water, carried a 40-liters jerry, shared with animals and family members. She brought home water contaminated with disease and faces that threatened the lives of her children. As did the other women and girls in Bamun Gaon, Shanti had visible wounds on her shoulders from the weight of carrying a jerry can for four hours every day. Like all the women and girls in her village, Shanti had little chance to thrive and change the course of her children's lives without clean water. She would have to do what many parents do here – marry her girls into families outside of Bamun Gaon. No one wants this life for their daughters. For years, Shanti advocated for clean, safe drinking water, menstrual hygiene for her children and community. Shanti's voice became louder and began to reach beyond Bamun Gaon. More and more people heard about the treacherous walk for water. Yet, everyone who visited told the people that clean water in Bamun Gaon is impossible. The village is too remote; the complexity of a deep well is too much.





"What is the day like for your children? Why is it this way?"-Shanti asked Chandra, Researcher of AIPA

Together, Chandra and Shanti met other women members of community, heard their struggle in collecting water, accessibility of health care services. They talked about their love for their children – and the great injustice of the different worlds in which they lived. Chandra told Shanti that no woman, no person should ever have to bear this burden. Then Chandra promised to work with Shanti and her community.

OUR INTEGRATED APPROACH CHANGED LIVES

This year 2018-2019, AIPA expanded its work in economic empowerment, and improved health, nutrition and education for the most vulnerable.

559 FARMERS EMPOWERED

AIPA expanded support for rural farmers through agriculture extension programmes like business trainings, irrigation and microloans. By investing in family farms, we improve nutrition and food access for the entire community.

FEMALE ENTREPRENEURS-129 LOANS FOR WOMEN

AIPA provided access to microloans through banks and trainings to women who, in turn, supported their families and community markets.

EMPOWERING GIRL LEADERS-242 TRAINED AT GIRLS' GROUPS

Girls learned about menstruation, early marriage, safety and hygiene at AIPA's school-based groups. Students then shared lessons with their peers and families, increasing the groups' impact. Our interviews with the girls' groups in the villages of Amdahara, Bejra show how a small group can create a big change.

MATERNAL CARE-432 BIRTHS THROUGH AIPA COMMUNITY HEALTH INITIATIVE

AIPA's community health -total health care services provided prenatal, delivery and postnatal care along with government public health centres for mothers and essential care for their families. The community health care services were provided by community volunteers of Amdahara, Bejra villages of Birbhum district, West Bengal and Bamon Gaon of Golaghat district, Assam.





WV-WE: WOMEN'S VOICE-WOMEN ECONOMIC EMPOWERMENT

AIPA's Women's Action for Voice and Economic Empowerment (WV-WE) is a civil participation programme focusing on equal representation and visibility of women and men.

WA-VE is also a movement, bringing women's organisations and the public together to challenge widespread imbalances of power and priority that negatively affect women and their human rights. WA-VE has a plan to deliver on its promise to women, including two women already in politics, women and young women with potential for political or civil leadership, and advocates for women's empowerment spanning all genders and tiers of society.



Women must have equal power and opportunity to make and act on economic decisions and share in economic benefit.

AIPA supports decent and safe work for all, equal pay for equal work, full and productive employment choices and respect for the substantial unpaid and informal work that women do around the world, because we know that gender equality and sustainable economic management go hand in hand. We generate new evidence and bring visibility to valuing women's unpaid work, reproductive roles and the care economy. Our program and project partnerships and our research work improve women's opportunities to earn and save and gain skills and knowledge in financial management and business or organisational development. We promote labour rights and land rights for women and resource organisations protecting the environment, the workplace or legislative settings to close the gender gap.

We support individuals and organisations to become independent thinkers, to drive their own agendas for sustainable livelihoods and access to financial services for all.

By investing in women-focused organisations we can achieve lasting community gains by addressing the root causes of social, political and economic problems. We can transform systems, structures and the social norms that create the present exclusion of the majority of citizens.

OUR IMPACT IN 2018-2019

HOW OUR APPROACH SUPPORTS SUSTAINABILITY

To create the greatest impact, AIPA invests in village communities for six years, aligns with the government's priorities and engages community members as partners in our work. We focus on four lifesaving services (clean water, education, health care and livelihoods) that hold up a community and build resilience. Here's how we plan and implement our work in rural India (Assam, Odisha and West Bengal).

STEP 1:


SELECT: AIPA engages the people of rural India from villagers to local government leaders in deciding where and how we do our work. We dedicate significant time to understanding the areas of deepest need and the local commitment to supporting our projects.

STEP 2:

PLAN: AIPA brings together the lifesaving projects proven to create real change in rural India. We customize our project plans to the critical needs and natural resource opportunities in each new community where we work. We prioritize our clean water, education, health care and livelihoods projects to create the deepest impact in each community.

STEP 3:

IMPLEMENT: Our long-term investment in India means we are deeply knowledgeable about how to impact change in the country.



We know the ecosystem of need and we eliminate bureaucracy through our established relationships at every level. We hire local NGOs to construct projects, we engage the government to provide support like qualified teachers and skilled health workers, and we lead custom trainings to elevate the impact of our projects. All of our work is led by our in-country staff of Indians who are experts in our projects.

STEP 4:

EMPOWER: In our work, everyone has a stake. Our process empowers community members to contribute cash and labour to the projects, and local government offices to provide staff and resources. AIPA's hand-over trainings and establishment of village committees support projects over the long-term.

STEP 5:

EVALUATE: AIPA is committed to monitoring our work and sharing the amazing stories of change with our supporters through village updates. We are constantly learning, applying our findings and sharing our work with the world.
